

I’m only going to give three names here: Howard Wax, who was my Co-President two years ago; Robin Sampliner, who was my Co-President this past year; and Bill Wahler, current Vice President who will replace me as Co-President. I've also written about *minhag* – the customs we follow in our worship, about the Jewish calendar, about life cycle and the process of reading the Torah in an endless cycle from week to week, and about Passover celebration. Last July I paused to introduce the new Board and review my first year as Co-President. Next I described my thoughts about our new slogan, “Your People, Your Community, Your Synagogue.” Somewhere along the way the **your's** got replaced by **our's**. Then came columns on the importance of the words we use, on the role of leadership, and on the importance of community.

I've also looked back on changes in my personal life. I moved from an apartment and bought a condo. My younger son Josh and his wife Jesse added a fourth grandchild to our family when my granddaughter Aubrey was born last July. Report from Indiana – the “New” URJ

In mid-April, I attended a Tri-Regional Small Congregations Conclave held at Temple Beth-El in Munster, Indiana, a 36-mile drive from my home. The gathering was sponsored by the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) and included the Great Lakes (Chicago), Midwest (St. Louis), and Northeast Lakes (Detroit) regions. I've found that there's a special vibrancy in congregations from small towns where members often form a tight sense of community because of their small numbers. Everyone knows everybody else and they all pitch in to help each other.

In many ways, I was aware how unique Congregation Or Chadash is. Most congregations talk about “membership span” – the time between when members join because their kids are ready for school and when they drop out, often after their kid's Bar/Bat Mitzvah. At Or Chadash we're not members in order to give our children a Jewish education; we join for ourselves, for our desire to be Jewish and part of a Jewish community.

Much of the time was spent reviewing the URJ restructuring, which goes into effect in July. This is a reorganization that has been in the works for quite a while. It is not a response to the current economy, although today's conditions did have an influence in pushing up the timetable for implementation. One of the key goals of the restructuring is to be able to better serve individual congregations – a goal that tries to address what many congregations have asked for from the URJ.

The current regional-based organization was established many years ago, long before the presence of the internet, of webinars and blogs, of teleconferences and cell phones. The new organization eliminates the current 14 separate regional offices – each with their own complete staffs and each independently trying to meet the needs of their congregations. Instead URJ will be organized around three main functional areas: Advancing Reform Judaism, Congregational Consultation, and Congregational Support. Individuals may work at one of four geographic Support Centers (Atlanta, Chicago, Los Angeles and New York – with an additional office in Canada) or out of their homes.

In brief, **Advancing Reform Judaism** will focus on global areas such as URJ Camps, the Religious Action Center (RAC) of Reform Judaism, Israel and world Jewry, etc. **Congregational Consultation** will have specialists in such areas as membership, fundraising, building sacred community, social justice, use of technology and training and mentoring congregational leaders.

Congregational Support will see a Congregational Representative assigned to individual congregations. Our representative will act as the single point-of-contact for all our support needs. This group also addresses rabbinic support and is the liaison to the URJ Lay Leadership. (The URJ Lay Leadership structure will not change at this time, because such a change would have to be approved by the lay membership as a whole, probably at the 2011 Biennial Convention.)

Unlike my Co-President Robin Sampliner, I have not been very much involved with the URJ and its Lay Leadership. But I see a great deal of potential help for Or Chadash as we wrestle with our own issues over the coming years and expect I shall be more involved in the future. We always need volunteers to help run Or Chadash so I urge you to become involved too. I'd be glad to share the materials I brought back from the conclave. Illinois Holocaust Museum Opens in Skokie

Sunday, April 19, was the Grand Opening and Dedication for the Illinois Holocaust Museum & Education Center in Skokie and I was one of the special guests in attendance – along with about 12,000 other special guests who braved the cold and rainy day.

The dedication consisted of numerous video presentations (several survivors, Steven Spielberg, President Barak Obama, Israeli President Shimon Peres and Hillary Rodham Clinton), entertainers (mostly Israeli and African-American) and live presentations from politicians (Skokie Mayor George Van Dusen, Illinois Governor Pat Quinn, and Klaus Scharioth, German Ambassador to the U.S.), museum representatives, survivors and others. The highlights of the afternoon were addresses by Elie Wiesel and President Bill Clinton. Elie Wiesel spoke about the fact that though we know more and more about the HOW of the Holocaust – the processes used by the Nazis – we will never really understand the WHY – why so many cultured, educated Germans behaved in such an evil fashion. President Clinton gave a dynamic speech about ongoing genocide in Rwanda, the Balkans, Darfur, and other places.

I was struck by the large presence of African-Americans on the program, the only minority group represented at the Dedication.

The program emphasized that fact that this is not just a museum, but also an education center. It stressed the fact that education of this period of history is important. Only the very first people to arrive got tickets for that day; I look forward to seeing the Museum for myself. General admission is only \$8.00.

Although a search on their website www.ilholocaustmuseum.org for the word “homosexual” only returns three minor references, the dedication itself was very clear in including non-Jews as victims of the Holocaust. In one of the first Survivor videos the woman made reference to speaking against a popular, but homophobic, local politician. And several of the speakers made it clear that not only Jews but also homosexuals, Gypsies and others who didn't match Hitler's ideal of Aryan perfection were targeted by the Nazis. J.B.Pritzker, who chaired the Capital Campaign for the Museum and was the afternoon's Master of Ceremonies, made it clear that the Holocaust was not only about Jews.

Mussar is a Jewish practice founded by a 19th-century rabbi, Israel Salanter. It emphasizes ethical conduct, living a more conscientious life, and an increased awareness of one's responsibilities toward oneself and others. In the Mussar practice, one focuses on soul traits (such as equanimity and patience) through meditation, journaling, and other means to help modify one's behavior and reactions. These exercises help one become more self-aware, content, and able to better contribute to one's immediate environment and community. Eve Kosofsky Sedgwick, of Blessed Memory

It took a long time for English departments to allow Jews to become tenured professors. How could these “foreigners” possibly understand English language and literature in the proper way? But Jews have made their way in the field, and some have even succeeded in stirring things up a little.

The news of the death of Eve Kosofsky Sedgwick sent me back to peruse the introduction to her most famous book, *Epistemology of the Closet*. It is a model of scholarly writing that is densely textured, forceful, and passionately human.

An obituary in *The New York Times* takes note of an essay by Sedgwick from 1983 on the Charles Dickens novel *Our Mutual Friend* in which

“she drew attention to the homoerotic element in the obsessive relationship between Eugene Wrayburn and Bradley Headstone, rivals for the love of Lizzie Hexam but emotionally most fully engaged when facing off against each other. ... Such subtexts, she insisted, are woven throughout literary texts, and the job of criticism is to ferret them out, especially the repressed themes of same-sex love.”

The article goes on,

“It’s about trying to understand different kinds of sexual desire and how the culture defines them,” Sedgwick told *The New York Times* in 1998, explaining the function of queer theory. “It’s about how you can’t understand relations between men and women unless you understand the relationship between people of the same gender, including the possibility of a sexual relationship between them.”¹

She was happily married for 40 years to Hal Sedgwick, a fact which marks her as “straight.” But part of the argument of her work is that people aren’t always so easily categorizable. Richard Kim wrote a remembrance in *The Nation*:

“Sedgwick’s work was marked throughout by an abiding love for gay people, gay men in particular. She once proposed that in a gay-affirmative world, there would be guide books on how to bring your kids up gay.”²

All the notices of her death acclaim her as one of the founders, perhaps *the* founder, of what has become the academic field of Queer Studies. Maybe this is what happens when Jews, and then Jewish women, start reading and commenting on the classics of English literature. We are often at our best, I think, when we are troubling the waters of assumption and theory.
