We continued our journey at Montefiori's Windmill with a shehecheyanu and Kiddush. Ah, what a view of Old Jerusalem. Bing, bang, boom, we were on the move. The itinerary had to be adjusted, and we never did make it to Eilat or Petra, but that's ok. There were plenty of other things to do. We participated in a scavenger hunt in the old city. Sadly I was not on the winning team, but had fun anyways. We had the best tour guide in all of Israel, Lyana. She knew everything about modern and ancient Israel. Thank goodness we never had to take a quiz, because my brain was swimming with all the information it was attempting to absorb.

We went to the shuk on a Friday afternoon. That is an experience in and of itself. Packed with people buying food for Shabbat. And if you are ever at Machne Yehuda market, stop by Marzipan for the best chocolate ruggelah in the world. YUM. Just a little piece of our culinary tastings that day. We had a chef guided tour through the market and ended up at her kitchen/studio to taste wine and cheeses from around the world.

We sifted through archaeological remains from the Second Temple period. I mainly found mosaic tiles and pottery shards. But my nephew found a large piece of marble that was placed in a plastic bag and numbered. Very exciting.

We went on a tour of the Western Wall Tunnels that run along the wall where Herod's Temple once stood. Considering we live in a very new country and walk on

very new stones and streets, it is quite amazing to walk on cobblestones that were once the center of ancient Jewish culture and civilization. The tunnels run under the Old City's Muslim Quarter. Above us stood modern day homes and businesses. Below were the ruins of a 2000 year old and older city.

We traveled to Rehovot and picked oranges for Table to Table. Or Chadash has donated tzedakah to this organization. The land we worked on was fully donated to charity and all groups had to do was bring volunteers to pick the fruit. We worked alongside a group of army soldiers.

In the middle of our trip, we went to the Dead Sea and swam, or should I say floated. Quite an experience if you ever have the opportunity. Seeing as it's the lowest place on earth, and has so much salt in the water, you can't sink! You can actually stand in the water with your feet not touching the ground. Very cool. Then onto Masada and Isabel's bat mitzvah.

Sadly, I was unable to climb the mountain; instead I took the tram with the grandparents. But that's OK. Talk about a casual setting. Everyone was in jeans and sweats. Sitting in an open air shelter. But very amazing. Here we were where once stood King Herod's hilltop fortress. Yes, it's where a group of zealots took refuge from Roman destruction of the Second Temple. Where they held off a Roman army siege. And they committed suicide. But it is also a place where the Jewish zealots

went to continue their religious practice and would do anything for their religious freedom. They died free Jews rather than slaves stripped of their faith.

Isabel did a wonderful job, I never doubted that she would. We sang. Threw candy. And had made it to the mountaintop to celebrate. Then dodged the raindrops back to the tram.

There isn't enough room for me to go on and on about my trip. And some of you might have stopped reading already. Some other points of interest that we visited: Yad Vashem, Mount Hertzal, Beit She'an (Egyptian ruins), ATV riding in Ein Zivan on the Lebanon border, thermal baths at Hammat Gader, shopping in Safed, reconstructed underground munitions factory at Ayalon Institute, Independence Hall in Tel Aviv where David Ben Gurion declared the State of Israel in 1948, shopping at Nahalat Binyamin, the Palmach Museum and of course the Western Wall on a Friday evening. And I haven't even mentioned all of the wonderful food we ate. YUM. Falafel. And hummus. We made it home in one piece without all the drama of the trip there. It was nice to be home. With my cat and my stuff. But Isabel's Bat Mitzvah Trip is something I will never forget. And in two weeks, she's gonna do it all again, here. What a trooper!

For the past five years we have had challenge grants: The first was sponsored by Steve Weiser and Carol Goldbaum; this was followed for three years by Norman Sandfield; and this past year Rob Pooley and Howard Wax sponsored our challenge grant. These challenge grants have raised \$80,000 over five years. This year we do not have a sponsor to lead us. So we will "Challenge Ourselves".

You may have been contacted by members of the congregation asking you to Challenge Yourself to keep Congregation Or Chadash in the black. Please give generously. These calls will begin near the end of the tax year and an opportunity to share your money with us instead of Uncle Sam. No congregation, no matter its size, can survive on dues alone. Usually, dues cover half or less of the expenses of running a synagogue. Last year our expenses exceeded our income by \$12,000. Thank goodness, we have a reserve fund, but it will not last long at that rate.

Congregation Or Chadash is a very special congregation. It is a family, a community, a place to explore your identity, and a place where you can return, as well as a wonderful mixture of ways to pray and play.

On **Thursday, February 25th**, Or Chadash will be serving over 200 sack meals along with members of The Night Ministry. Since 1976, The Night Ministry, a non-denominational, non-profit organization, has served Chicago's most vulnerable populations, providing them with everything from resources, to shelter, and meals.

This is a tremendous mitzvah project and the good news is there is more than one way to help.

1) Tzedaka Cans- please bring in your cans and/donations by **February 5th**. These funds will be used to purchase supplies for meal distribution.

2) Donating items- As of now we need the following items in quantities that will accommodate 200 individuals: brown paper bags, sliced wheat bread, turkey lunch meat, sliced cheese, packets of mayo and mustard, napkins, juice box and/or bottles of water, chips/pretzels, granola bars/Rice Krispy treats, tangerines/clementines, small toiletries (soap, shampoo, etc.)

3) Assembling Sack Meals- We will be assembling meals at **Temple Emanuel** on **Wednesday, February 24th** from **6:30pm-8:30pm**.

4) Meal Distribution- We will meet at the **corner of Division & California** at the bus. We will be there from **7pm-9:00pm**.

On January 9th, I participated in Affinity's annual Burning Bowl Ceremony. For 14 years, Affinity, a non-profit organization, has served the black lesbian community through a combination of educational, social and community collaborations. One of the central elements of Affinity's mission has been the

creation of opportunities for visibility, empowerment, and leadership for black lesbians locally, while serving as a national organizing model. Their annual Burning Bowl Celebration offers community members an opportunity to reflect on personal growth during the past year and focus on goals for the one that has just begun. I was proud to read a portion of Unetaneh Tokef from our Machzor, *Kol Haneshamah: Prayerbook for the Days of Awe* (The Reconstructionist Press, 1999), on behalf of our congregation. The prayer was well received and will be archived in Affinity's library.

It was wonderful to hear a mixture of sermons, Buddhist chants, Hebrew a cappella, African drum beats, and let's not forget witnessing good old fashioned trash-can pyrotechnics! More than that, it was inspiring to see how Affinity has become a vital network for the Black LGBTQ community; offering resources, support groups, parenting classes, bible study, scholarships and so much more. Yes, Affinity may serve a different population than Or Chadash, but what binds the two entities is that both were formed when society closed its doors to gay, lesbians, bisexuals and transgender individuals of all races, religions and creeds. For that reason, I am in ongoing conversations with Kim Hunt, Executive Director of Affinity, to see how else our two communities can support each other.

According to a study conducted by the University of Illinois at Chicago, nearly 2,000 youths wander the streets of Chicago without a safe place to sleep. Though the reasons vary, a study conducted by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force in 2006 found that nearly a quarter of these youths identified themselves as LGBT. The study also showed that many of these youths were forced to leave their homes because they were either ridiculed, threatened with violence or, in some cases, even assaulted.

Join us on **February 19th at 7:00pm** as we welcome **Bonnie Wade**, the founding associate director of the LGBTQ Host Home Program at UCAN, an innovative housing model that is an alternative to the shelter system. Ms. Wade has over 15 years of social service experience, 11 of which were dedicated to working specifically with LGBTQ youth. Ms. Wade, along with two youths currently enrolled in her LGBTQ Host Home Program, will be speaking on teen homelessness and what can be done to address it following our catered Shabbat Seuda. **Ms. Wade and her youth will also be attending our Shabbat Meal thanks to the generosity of our congregation.**

Yasher koach!

I have spent much of this morning watching videos and reading news reports about the Israeli rescue teams operating in Haiti. The Jewish people support many fine organizations that do important work all over the world. In a crisis like the one in Haiti, though, the Jewish organization best-equipped to respond with immediate, meaningful assistance is the State of Israel.

You know that I have many disagreements with Israel over matters of politics and policy. It is not yet the state that I hope it will become. (Neither is Massachusetts, for that matter.) But when it comes to saving lives in desperate emergency situations, Israel brings tears of joy and admiration to my eyes.

The field hospital that Israel set up in Port-au-Prince is state-of-the-art, and was up and running well before anything comparable from the United States. CBS News called it “the Rolls Royce” of field hospitals.

Sadly, Israel has had too much experience in emergency medicine, disaster relief, and field hospitals. She has put this experience to good use, however, around the world. Israel was a first responder to the Turkey earthquake in 1999 and the bombing of the U.S. Embassy in Kenya in 2006.

I have also noted a few critical voices in the Israeli press and Jewish blogosphere claiming that much of this effort is directed toward public relations, and is carried out at the expense of needed efforts closer to home. Even if true, it takes nothing away from the men and women who have placed themselves in difficult circumstances to help save lives. And if the Israeli field hospital is a superior model, than let others learn from Israeli experience.

The More Things Change the More They Stay the Same
a.k.a. The More Things Stay the Same, the More They Change
Or Chadash spring classes begin in March!

Being Jewish is like being in a long, long relationship: you change, your partner changes, the world changes around you, and still you love each other. This spring, we will get together and study texts that haven't changed and texts that have, how new happenings in the worlds around us have changed our ideas.

*The Torah was written by human beings, not by God.

*The overwhelming majority of Jews view the modern return of the Jewish people to the Land of Israel as political; Christians and Muslims mainly see it as theological.

*Judaism was primarily seen as exclusive; increasingly, we look for ways to make it inclusive.

*Jewish suffering used to be seen as divine punishment; now such a view would typically be seen as anti-Semitic, or some version of internalized self-hatred.

*The phrase ‘tikkun olam’ has taken on a very broad meaning of something like ‘peace and social justice’. That is not what it originally meant.

As usual, our sessions will be a combination of text study and lively debate!

11:15 am – 11:45 a.m. Rabbi Edwards will continue his popular “*Biblical Hebrew Verse of the Day*,” pulling apart the grammar and meaning of a selected Biblical verse to help us improve our Hebrew and our understanding of the biblical text. **This is a free class.**

11:45 am – 1:00 p.m. Howard Aronson will teach “*5 Texts of Judaism*”. We will read and discuss 5 major texts of Judaism from their contemporary points of view. These texts will be: the Ten Commandments, the 13 Attributes of God, the Shema, Rambam’s 13 Articles of Faith, and the Reform movement Pittsburgh Platforms (1885 and 1999).
