Vote for Your Own Tzedaka Charity for 2010-2011

This year, as opposed to organizing several tzedaka drives throughout the year, Congregation Or Chadash will collect tzedaka can **throughout the year** and in July 2011, all funds raised will be **equally divided** among three charities. One will automatically be the Rabbi's discretionary fund. The other two will be charities all OC members can vote on. One charity will go toward an organization that focuses its efforts in the Jewish community; the other will be one that focuses its efforts on the LGBT community. All votes/suggestions must be in by August 19.

Please note; this drive will **remain separate from our annual AIDS Walk/Run drive.**

Suggestions for Jewish Charities:

- 1) **Jewish United Fund/Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago**
- 2) **The Ark** - provides free social and medical services to help distressed members of our Chicagoland Jewish family return to self-sufficiency.
- 3) **Chevra Kadisha of Chicago** - a society of men and women who care for the dead from time of death until interment. They perform the ritual purification and the dressing in traditional shrouds in accordance with Jewish Law.

Suggestions for LGBT Charities:

- 1) **Howard Brown** - promotes the well-being of LGBT persons through the provision of health care and wellness programs, including clinical, educational, social service and research activities.
- 2) **Equality Illinois** – secures, protects and defends the rights of LGBTs in Illinois.
- 3) **Jewish Mosaic** - helps the Jewish world become more open, accessible, and welcoming to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender Jews and their families.

Help Local Students Start the Year Off Right By Donating School Supplies

Due to last year's rousing success, Congregation Or Chadash will once again host a **school supply drive** for Care for Real, a local charity that will distribute these supplies to needy area children.

Throughout the month of **August** we will have a collection bin set up outside of our Friday night services. Items they are asking for in particular are: pens, pencils, folders, wide ruled notebook paper, Texas Instrument calculators, supply boxes, highlighters, erasers, spiral notebooks, markers, colored pencils, crayons, assignment notebooks, Kleenex, glue sticks and scissors.

Plus, this year, you get to do a mitzvah and save! Illinois will temporarily suspend 5% of its sales tax from Aug 6th to Aug. 15th for those buying most school supplies. That means, if you buy your school supplies during this week, you will **only pay 1.25% in sales tax!**

And May We Never Forget Also

On Saturday, July 17, longtime Or Chadash member Norman Sandfield took a trip to the Illinois Holocaust Museum & Education Center in Skokie (www.ilholocaustmuseum.org). He went to meet their Librarian, Matthew Sackel, and donate four books from his library that cover the persecution of homosexuals in Nazi Germany and the Holocaust. The pink triangle that became one of the early symbols of the gay rights movement was the symbol worn by these persecuted homosexuals. Gay Jewish prisoners wore a pink triangle over a yellow triangle.

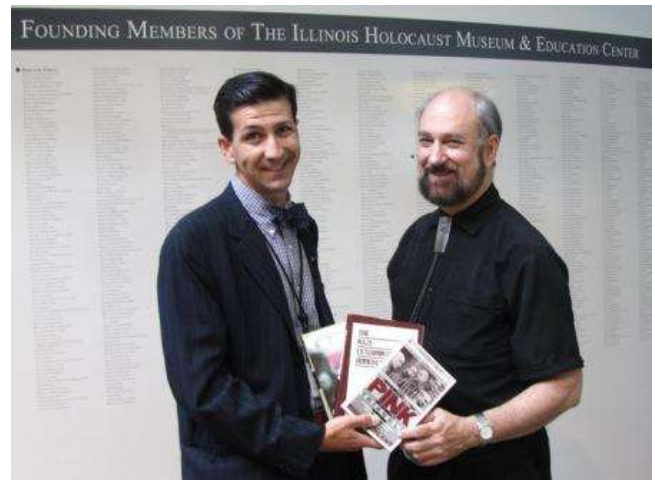
On his first visit, soon after it opened last year, Norman learned from the docent about the sign in the permanent exhibit that talks about all of the other groups, including homosexuals (mostly gay men), who were tortured and killed by the Nazis, besides the well-known six million Jews. The docent stated that this one facet of the exhibit was the one that most surprising to visiting student tour groups.

These four books (The Pink Triangle: The Nazi War Against Homosexuals by Richard Plant ; The Men with the Pink Triangle: The True Life-and-Death Story of Homosexuals in the Nazi Death Camps by Heinz Heger, David Fernbach, and Klaus Muller; The Nazi Extermination of Homosexuals by Frank Rector; An Underground Life: Memoirs of a Gay Jew in Nazi Berlin, by Gad Beck) will join one video on the subject already in the Library's collection, to allow visitors, students, and researchers to better understand the horrors of the Holocaust faced by so many different groups of people.

Congregation Or Chadash has a group visit to the Museum on its list of unscheduled events. We hope you will be able to join us at that time.

Join Or Chadash for the High Holidays

The High Holidays are a special time of the year at Or Chadash. Beginning with Selichot through Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, and culminating with Hakafot for Simchat Torah, we study, pray and celebrate together. We invite you to join us.

Selichot services this year will be on **Saturday September 4th, 9 PM, at Emanuel**. The program will be led by Rabbi Larry Edwards and Rabbi Michael Zedek of Emanuel.

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services will again be held at JRC, the Jewish Reconstructionist Congregation located at **303 Dodge Ave. in Evanston**.

Parking is available in a lot across the street from the synagogue and on streets adjacent to the synagogue. Parking is also available in the parking lot of the Levy Center, across Dodge Ave., if needed. For those who use public transit, the # 97 bus stops right across the street from the synagogue; consult the CTA Trip Planner to learn where to catch this bus. (The route has changed and it no longer leaves from the Howard "L" stop.) We also plan to set up car pools, especially for those who need to get back to the city following evening services. Please contact the office for travel assistance.

Tickets are required for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services. Members receive one ticket for individual memberships, two for family memberships. Members may also reserve tickets for their guests at a cost of \$180/ticket. Non-member ticket price is \$250 with a reduced fee of \$180 for those under 30. There is no charge for tickets for full-time students who present a valid student ID.

We also invite you to join us for our Rosh Hashanah luncheon. The luncheon this year will be held at **Gulliver's, 2727 West Howard**, just a few blocks from the synagogue. **Reservations are required and must be received by September 3rd**. The cost is \$20/person.

Something different this year is that Taschlich will be held not following Rosh Hashanah services, but on Friday evening, September 10th. We will meet on the beach by Emanuel at 7:15, and then continue with Shabbat Shuvah services at 8 PM, also at Emanuel.

One of the features that makes the High Holidays so special at Or Chadash is that we try to involve as many members as possible in our services. We will be in touch with you in the next few weeks, to see how you can participate in our services.

Season of Heat and Return

I just re-read a few of my August newsletter columns. They include thoughts on the month of Elul and the hard work of teshuvah; reports from Jerusalem, including WorldPride; hope that God's response to our earnest seeking will be to strengthen us in our seeking, and to help us strengthen one another. These are indeed the themes of this hot and muggy time of year. The seven weeks that extend between Tisha B'av and Rosh Hashanah are meant to raise our sights, lift our vision. Each week the prophet Isaiah of the Exile (that is, mainly the chapters of Isaiah from 40 onward, spoken in Babylonia) echo and re-echo the theme of Return. The Prophet is speaking about the return and rebuilding of the earthly Jerusalem, and at the same time the spiritual returning to the Covenant between Israel and God.

This is how it is with the prophets. Building Jerusalem, both the one below and the one above, requires both engineers and visionaries. The Torah, the expression of our covenant with the Divine Presence, points us in the direction of concrete action in this world. We are therefore not permitted to stand aside from politics, messy as it usually is. And our politics must be informed by the values we have received from Torah, must breathe with spirit.



Arthur Waskow has just written mightily, and gently, about this, watching his granddaughter, Yaela, chatting with seagulls:

I wonder: What earth, what ocean, are we bequeathing her? Will her child someday be able to sit beside the great Atlantic as the waves come rolling in, not poisoned by our oil?

Will her child someday be able to babble with the seagulls, not besmirched by oil, not dying breathless as the Breathing Name of God, YHWH, collapses in exhaustion?

... That is why we will gather at the Capitol at noon tomorrow [Tisha B'Av], the day we grieve our imperiled Temple -- Earth. The day we turn hope into action to face a Senate that is itself besmirched with oil, with oily money, and therefore will not act to heal the earth from the climate crisis that besets us, and leave to Yaela's child, a generation hence, sea-gulls she can sing with.

Hope, turning, the call to act – these are our prophetic inheritance, and they accompany us through these weeks of turning, and through all the weeks of all our years.

P.S. Thank you for your healing prayers. By the time you read this, I hope to be coming along nicely.
